With the podcast listenership quickly rising the world over, more and more podcasters are jumping in to create quality **programs** to pique the interest of their listeners. Difficult as this may sound, it does not cost you much money, nor does it take a lot of technical skills. All you need is a step-by-step walkthrough on how to begin podcasting.

For starters, deciding on the theme and name is essential. If you can come up with a list of at least 10-15 episodes relevant to your theme, your podcast is sure to be intriguing and insightful. The name of your podcast also matters. You may use a descriptive name so that listeners know what your podcast is about or an eye-catching name to hook potential listeners.

Second, it is advisable to use proper equipment and software to enhance the quality of podcasting. Your smartphone is a handy recording **device**, but if you want to have clear and professional sounding, a microphone attachment is ideal. In addition, the post-production process is necessary. Software should be helpful for editing your **episode**, stabilizing the volume, and removing gaps of dead air or any mistakes you might have made.

Finally, it is time to publish your podcast programs. Instead of uploading podcast files to iTunes, Spotify, or any other directory, you upload your audio to hosting websites where your **audio files** are stored and delivered to your listeners on demand. Websites like *Buzzsprout*, *Captivate*, or *Transistor* are established online platforms on the market that provide user-friendly podcast hosting services. Once you submit your episodes, your listeners can discover, subscribe to, and download them anytime, anywhere.

Have you ever called Apple's customer service department about a problem with your iPhone or amazon.com with a question about an order you are waiting for? Have you thought about who you are talking with on the other end of the phone? The speaker probably has strong English skills but doesn't sound quite like a native speaker. Chances are you are not conversing with someone in a basement office at Apple headquarters or an amazon service center, but rather with a representative in one of the hundred call centers located in different areas around the world.

The two countries with the highest concentration of call centers are India and the Philippines. The two reasons that make these locations so attractive are a large pool of university graduates who

are fluent in English and a salary scale much lower than that in the developed world. For example, the 700,000 call center workers in India earn an average salary of US\$300 per month, while the one million workers in the Philippines make about \$700. Most call center workers are employed by companies from the US, UK, the Australia, and New Zealand, and these salaries are much less than workers in host companies would demand.

Call centers perform two primary functions. The first is handling customer complaints and inquiries, such as the Apple or Amazon customers mentioned above. The second is conducting telemarketing or market research campaigns. This involves calling people in these developed countries to find out their feelings about the products offered by these Western companies.

In recent years, there have been growing complaints against the treatment of workers at these call centers. In addition to the low pay offered by the host companies, employee burnout has also become an issue. Typical workers—university graduates, under 30, unmarried—are usually required to work long hours without breaks. They are often required to work all night long as this corresponds with the time most customers in the west are seeking assistance. These overworked, underpaid employees help to keep prices lower on all kinds of products for western consumers.
